<u>Purpose</u>: This exhibit shows letters passed to shipping agents in New York, and letters mailed from a selection of other US post offices via New York, to illustrate Freight Money rates charged by pioneer steam and sailing packet companies from New York to England between 1838 and 1848. Letters are shown indicating to whom monies were paid, inland postage and packet ship details.

Treatment: In approximate chronological order from 1838

- · Return voyages of the initial steamers 'Sirius' and 'Royal William'
- Examples of letters passed to shipping agents at New York for steamers 'Great Western', 'Liverpool', 'British Queen', 'President' and 'United States'.
- Examples of Freight Money cover payments made to provincial Post Offices including some alongside New York origin covers on the same voyage.
- · Examples of use from Quebec, Canada, to UK via New York.
- Examples of sailing packet Freight Money charges by various sailing packet companies overlapping with the steam ship sailings.
- · Examples of late use from 1845 to 1848.


Scope & Study: Examples from the five principal post offices using the service are shown: Philadelphia, Baltimore, New Orleans, Charleston and Richmond, plus Auburn and Norfolk. These post offices give rise to 311 of the 318 Freight Money covers known from the USA. Significant items are highlighted in red.

US steamship freight charge for letters was 25¢ per sheet from 30th June 1838.
 US sailing packets charged 12½¢ per sheet from 26th October 1838,
 paid to the shipping agents, directly or by the US Post Office.

Unpaid single letter sent from New York via Falmouth to London on board pioneer steamer 'Sirius' in May 1838



The New York Albion for May 5, 1838 reported as follows:

"The Sirius (the first commercial transatlantic steamer) sailed on Monday for London... It is stated that the Sirius took with her 17,000 letters, for which no charge whatever was made... Supposing each letter had been charged at a quarter of a dollar, it would have yielded upward of \$4000 say £1000 sterling!"

The shipping agents for the 'SS Great Western' responded quickly, and an advertisement that appeared June 19, 1838 in the New York Commercial Advertiser stated:

"Letters received on board will be charged 25 cents per single sheet; large letters and parcels in proportion."






Rates: 11d Cy Canadian postage to the US border; 183¢ US postage from the border to New York.

From mid-September 1838 the Montreal, Kingston and Queenston exchange offices could make up mails for the respective steamer agents, accompanied by special letter bills for the New York postmaster whereby the letter bags would be delivered to the ship's agents. A Canadian postmaster circular dated 26th December 1838 added that sailing vessels were included. A Canadian Post Office circular dated 4th December 1840 stopped the collection of freight money.


