

First Flight Commercial Inland Air Service in Great Britain (April 12, 1933)

On April 12, 1933 the Great Western Railway inaugurated the first commercial, inland air service in Great Britain. Operating between Cardiff Air Port (serving Cardiff and Newport), Haldon Aerodome (serving Teignmouth and Torquay) and Roborough Aerodrome (serving Plymouth). On the initial flight mail was carried by Mr. Phillips a passenger.







12 April 1933 Cardiff to Plymouth and return, signed by the pilot, Capt. Gordon Olley accepted at GWR Newport High St. with two 3d newspaper parcels stamps, $4\frac{1}{2}$ d postage paid Cardiff Registered datestamps, delivered to Cardiff aerodrome and then by air to Plymouth GWR Plymouth (North Rd) oval arrival and returned to Cardiff aerodrome

the only round trip cover carried on this inaugural flight (cover specifically described in 1935 article by the mail-carrier, Phillips)





Introduction of the G.W.R. 3d Air Mail Stamp (May 15, 1933)

On May 15, 1933 the Great Western Railway issued 3d stamps for their Air Service. A total of 10,000 stamps were printed in sheets of 20 (4 rows of 5 each) and control numbers were added starting with far right column, top to bottom and continuing left to right in each successive column.






22 May 1933 Birmingham to Plymouth where it entered the mails first day of service on inaugural flight from Birmingham




22 May 1933 Plymouth to Birmingham where it entered the mails first day use carried on the first return flight of the day

Last Day of Service (September 30, 1933)

After sustaining financial losses on their Air Service, the G.W.R. suspended operations on September 30, 1933. After making it from Birmingham to Cardiff, the final flight departed for Plymouth but was forced to return due to bad weather at destination.
