tenderness towards you and sorely grieved was i to hear by
another Albert's letter, that you had been very sick in New
York, and i was very much disappointed in not receiving
a line from you by the ship Barnstable, next to my dear
Meliza and children, you dear Elisabeth are seated in my
affections, and knowing your delicate health, i feel more
than a brothers anxiety for your welfare, let nothing for
one moment prevent you from making my house your
home, as it seems as tho' you must have been discontented
when you made that Journey to New York, if i Judge
wrong pardon me dear Sister, and do not suppose for a moment
that any selfish motive prevades my bosom, god who knows
my heart knows also that i possess no other feeling toward
you than pure affection, and an earnest desire for the recovery
of your health, & consequently with your angelic disposition the
enjoyment of true happiness, when we shall meet again the
all wise disposer of events knows best, the war has seriously
interfered with our business and will prolong our voyage
without doubt another year, therefore we have nothing to
do but submit, and bring our minds to believe, that what
ever is, is right it certainly is very hard to be separated
from all that we hold dear for so long a period but when
we reflect upon the countless blessings we enjoy during
that separation, ought not our hearts to be thankful
and should we not be ready to say not my will but thine
Lord be done, how much i long to see you your own

RURAL FREE DELIVERY & THE DOANES.

In December of 1899 the P.O. Department issued a new type of postmark as illustrated above. The numeral in the PM denotes the rural route it was carried on. The test was from 1900 to July 1903. The postal card is a fine example of the first year of this test postmarked at R.F.D./LISCOMB OCT 29 1900. A postal GEM.



IN 1903 the P.O. Dept. altered the R.F.D. Postmark with a circular type as illustrated by the cover above, DUELM MINN OCT 21 2pm 1907, bearing the numeral 4 in 4 bars, tying the Pocahontas stamps of the 1907 issue. A registered cover bearing a handstamped figure of a dogs head with a tag on its collar R.E.G. No 23. SEE U.S.DOANES by Helbeck & Anderson page 6.
