ANNOUNCEMENT.

The business of manufacturing Post Office boxes and supplies, including everything needed for the complete working equipment of a Post Office of any size, was first established by this Company, (the corporate title of which was then THE YALE LOCK MFG. Co.), nearly twenty years ago. Commencing with a few men, occupying but a small part of the Company's Works, this business has constantly grown so that larger facilities for it have been required at frequent intervals. It now occupies a large building, erected especially for it, and entirely devoted to the manufacture of Post Office equipments. This department of the Company's Works is fully equipped with the most modern machinery, including many special machines and appliances designed especially for the production of this work. In the drawing office are accumulated some thousands of designs for Post Offices for cities and towns in every part of the United States. The complete "Yale" Outfits are in use in every State in the Union, and in many hundred Post offices; while the "Yale" lock boxes are in use in more than three thousand Post Offices. The vast experience thus acquired and the unrivaled facilities provided for this business, enable us to furnish the best and the cheapest Post Office equipments in the world.

The "Yale" Outfits and Equipments, universally recognized as the most convenient, complete, and perfect equipments for business which it is possible to procure, have

heretofore been designed chiefly for Post Offices of the larger and medium sizes. Believing that in the smaller Post Offices, as well as in the large ones, Postmasters desire to have handsome and convenient equipments, we have designed a series of Cabinets adapted to small offices, which, while being proportionately as handsome and convenient as those we have heretofore built for the larger offices, should be of such moderate cost as to permit of their adoption generally in offices of any size. The preparation of this new line of work occupied us for many months, and the results are partly embodied in the following pages, which illustrate a great variety of Cabinets for Post Offices of small and medium sizes.

The distinguishing feature of the Cabinets is that each is in itself an entirely complete Post Office. The purchaser has only to place it in position to have a complete working Post Office ready for business.

Especial care has been taken to provide designs of such range and variety as to meet every ordinary requirement. Postmasters, by carefully examining the numerous styles and sizes, can in almost every case select one of our regular styles, and in this way obtain the benefit of the low prices herein quoted, and which are possible only by reason of the manufacture of this work in quantity and of regular styles. Special work can also be furnished when desired, but necessarily at higher prices.

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HOW WILL IT BENEFIT ME TO SPEND MONEY FOR POST OFFICE FIXTURES?

This question is often asked by Postmasters, and we, therefore, state a few of the many reasons why an outlay for good fixtures is the best investment a Postmaster can make.

A Postmaster in taking office has three parties to consider -the government, the public, and himself. It is clear that lock boxes and other convenient postal arrangements will benefit the government, because the box rents will be greater, and because it is an undoubted fact that the more facilities an office affords, the more business it will do. The advantages which lock boxes and other improvements offer to the public, viz., greater security, quickness of delivery, and convenience, are obvious. To sum up, the more convenient an office is the more business will it do and the greater will be its receipts. Coming now to consider the Postmaster, we find that, under the law, those very things which benefit both the government and the public, benefit him also. That is, every Postmaster is directly benefited by any increase in his box rents and other office receipts (see Act March 3, 1883), his salary increasing as the receipts increase. The law is specially favorable to Postmasters of the fourth class, who retain all their box rents.

And apart from the increase of salary, it will pay every Postmaster to gain the good will of his fellow citizens by providing improved and convenient post office fixtures, as he will thus show his fitness for the place, and his desire to do his best to accommodate the public. It need not be said that the Postmaster who conducts his office on this principle stands a much better chance of a reappointment when his term expires, than one who thinks only of himself and does not care whether the public likes his office or him.

The Postmasters who retain their offices for long periods—some as long as twenty years—will be found to be those who are alive to the wants of the community and who strive to satisfy them.

It being shown, then, that convenient and attractive fixtures are indispensable in every properly conducted post office, we submit that Postmasters desiring to get such fixtures will forward their own interests by first consulting with those who have had most experience in work of this sort.

This Company has had more than fifteen years' experience in fitting up offices complete, i. e., in transforming empty rooms into perfectly fitted post offices. It has equipped, in whole or in part, thousands of post offices scattered over every State and Territory of the United States. Its experience, which is unquestionably greater in this department than that of any other concern or individual in the world, is freely placed at the disposal of everyone who contemplates fitting up or refitting a post office.

HOW TO DEFRAY THE COST OF LOCK BOXES AND EQUIPMENTS.

Postmasters are sometimes deterred from the purchase of lock boxes by reason of the amount of their first cost. To aid them in considering the advisability of such an investment, we offer the following suggestions:

It should be borne in mind from the outset that the use of lock boxes is of equal advantage to the Postmaster and to the box-renter. They save the Postmaster and his assistants nearly one-half the labor of distributing mail matter, because after it is once placed in the lock boxes it requires no further attention on their part. They save the box-renter all loss of time in waiting his turn at a delivery wicket, and enable him to obtain his own mail at all times, without delay of any kind. It is no exaggeration to say that a lock box will pay for itself, both to the Postmaster and box-renter, in one year's use. An appreciation of these mutual advantages has led to the procuring of lock boxes in the following ways:

First,—By Subscription. In this case the Postmaster obtains subscriptions from business men and others, who appreciate and desire the advantages of lock boxes, to an agreement under which each subscriber agrees to purchase a box,

the Postmaster simply collecting their subscriptions and forwarding them with the order to us, with instructions as to the number and arrangement of the boxes. To facilitate this method we furnish, upon application, a handsomely printed "Subscription Notice," containing a representation of a nest of lock boxes. The posting of this notice in any office not already supplied with lock boxes will almost always result in subscriptions from persons who are willing to incur the slight expense involved. In this way the Postmaster, without any expense to himself, can improve the efficiency of his office and obtain the advantage of greater ease in the distribution of mails as explained above. It has been officially decided that money collected in this way for the purchase of lock boxes does not come under the head of postal receipts, and need not be accounted for in any way to the Department. The lock boxes when obtained, however, even if purchased by the patrons of the office, must, under the rulings of the Department, still be rented in the same manner, and at a rental at least equal to that paid for other boxes in the same office. These rentals must be collected regularly each quarter, and

accounted for to the Department as a portion of the postal receipts. In the case of fourth-class offices, where the box rents go to increase the salary of the Postmaster, he is of course largely and directly benefited by the introduction of these boxes.

Second,—By DIRECT PURCHASE. In this case the boxes are purchased outright from us, either by the Postmaster himself, or by the owner of the building in which the post office is located, and by whom it is rented to the Department, or to the Postmaster.

The advantages to the Postmaster resulting from the introduction of lock boxes are fully explained on page 4. They benefit him by the saving of labor effected (which often results in the reduction of clerk hire), by the increase in his salary resulting from the increase of box rents and, indirectly, by the general improvement in the efficiency of his office and the greater satisfaction to his patrons which results therefrom, Post Office fixtures of standard construction are almost always salable in case the office changes hands.

In offices of the first and second class the fixtures are, in nearly all cases, purchased by owners of buildings, who lease to the Government rooms completely fitted up for Post Office use. Under the present law, the P. O. Department has authority also to lease rooms for offices of the third class,

but it has not, as yet, been able to do this to any great extent, owing to insufficient appropriations. Further agitation of this matter, particularly among Postmasters interested, should result in rendering effective this evident act of justice to Postmasters of the third class.

In cases where the Government pays the rent of an office it is the practice for the Postmaster, when in his opinion the accommodations are insufficient, to report the facts to the Inspector for his district, who will then examine the case and will in turn report to the Department. Should the report of the Inspector indicate that improvements are desirable, and that the office should be improved, or its location changed, the Department then usually advertises for proposals for a suitable room, provided with the proper number and kind of boxes and equipments. When this is done, the Postmaster should at once promptly notify us, sending, if possible, a diagram of the room in which the office is to be located, and a statement of the number of call and lock boxes and other conveniences wanted. On receipt of this information we will then promptly send him a complete drawing showing such an equipment as we would propose to furnish, and quote him a price for the same. In most cases, if desired, we can send a representative to confer on the spot with the parties interested.

TERMS OF PAYMENT.

For the Better Accommodation of Customers, we offer a Choice of Two Methods of Payments, viz.:

INSTALMENT PLAN.—Cabinets purchased on this plan are to be paid for by remitting one-fourth of the instalment price with the order, and the balance by three notes, payable quarterly, without interest.

The notes for the three quarterly payments will mature in all cases on the 10th days of January, April, July and October. This system is adopted so that all payments will fall due after the box rents are received in each quarter; and to make the box rents available for payment of the first instalment the latter will not mature until the SECOND QUARTER DAY after the cabinet is ordered. Thus, if a cabinet is ordered on January 15th, one-fourth of the price is to be remitted with the order; the next (the first instalment payment), will then not be due until July 10th; the third payment on October 10th; the fourth or final payment, on January 10th. It will thus be seen that the earlier in any quarter an order is placed, the longer will be the time before the first instalment payment is due.

paid for by a remittance, with the order, of the FULL CASH PRICE of the Cabinet.

It will be noticed that the cash price is greatly reduced from the instalment price. While the latter is extremely low we desire to transact as much business as possible on a cash basis, so as to avoid opening so many accounts on our books, and to save time, correspondence, etc. The cash price is accordingly made so low that Postmasters will find it advantageous, even where they have not the money at hand, to borrow the amount necessary to remit the cash with the order, as the interest on the loan will be much less than the difference in price.

In ordering always use the enclosed order blanks, filling out and sending us either the cash or instalment blank, as preferred.

WEIGHTS AND RATES.

To enable purchasers to estimate the probable cost of our "Standard" Cabinets laid down at their nearest freight point, we append below a table giving the weights of the various Cabinets described in this catalogue, boxed, ready for shipment, and also the freight rates per 100 lbs. from Stamford, Conn., to various centers. While these rates are subject to fluctuations, they are sufficiently reliable to indicate that the cost of transportation is but a small item of expense.

The "Standard" P. O. Cabinets may be ordered from our Works at Stamford, or from our offices in New York, Philadelphia, Chicago, or Boston, at each of which we keep them in stock, the freight charges from these points only being borne by purchasers.

NEW STYLE POST OFFICE CABINETS.

Heretofore the "Yale" equipments have been designed chiefly for offices of large and medium sizes, but during the past year a series of equipments for smaller offices have been prepared. In perfecting these latter designs a large number of experimental cabinets were built, and most careful study was given to every detail, so as to produce a maximum of convenience and finish with a minimum of cost, and to thus enable the smaller post offices to procure outfits proportionately as convenient and handsome as those in use in the

The distinguishing feature of the new "Standard" cabinets is that each is in itself an entirely complete post office. Each

contains call boxes (numbered outside and inside), alphabetical boxes for general delivery, a delivery wicket, money drawer, drop-letter box, and pigeon holes for postal cards, stamped envelopes, advertised letters, etc. The purchaser has only to place the cabinet in position on his counter to have a complete working post office, ready for business.

MATERIAL.—The entire front, sash and cornice of each cabinet is of selected American ash, handsomely paneled and molded, and finely finished and varnished. The boxes are made of well-seasoned poplar or whitewood, smoothly finished.

NUMBERING.—Each call box is provided with a handsome brass number plate, numbered in red and black and enamel finished. The rear end of each box is also numbered to correspond, and has a card-board blank attached to wood strips, on which to write the name of the box renter.

SASHES.—The sashes covering the call boxes are of ash, glazed with double thick clear French glass, and are so arranged that in less than two minutes, by removing a few screws, each sash can be detached from the cabinet so as to permit of being cleaned on the inside when necessary.


ALPHABETICAL BOXES .-

Each cabinet is provided with a series of boxes for the "general delivery" of mail to persons not renting call boxes. These are located behind the paneled woodwork of the front, and are divided into two groups, those on one side of the wicket being for letter delivery, and those on the other side for newspaper delivery. The pigeon holes of each group are distinctly lettered, alphabetically, on the most approved system, thus facilitating easy assortment and delivery of the mail matter.

EXTRA PIGEON HOLES.

Above the delivery wicket are pigeon holes, properly labeled, for stamped envelopes, postal cards, and advertised letters.

DELIVERY WICKET.—Each cabinet (except Nos. 21 and 24), has a handsome delivery wicket, with shelf projecting both in front and to the rear, and with double doors closing from behind, properly fastened, the whole being made of ash and finely finished. A heavy brass guard is permanently framed into the wicket, in front of the doors, so constructed as to permit of the convenient passing of mail matter, but preventing any access to the interior of the boxes through the wicket.

CASH AND STAMP DRAWER.—Each cabinet is provided with a drawer, placed beneath the shelf of the delivery wicket, and secured by a "Standard" lock with two flat keys. This drawer contains compartments for bank notes and stamps, and a sliding tray for coins.

LETTER-DROP AND SIGN.—Each cabinet has a polished brass plate bearing the words "u. s. MAIL—LETTER BOX," surrounding the drop-letter opening, through which mail matter can be dropped from the outside into a receptacle formed in the lower part of the cabinet, and closed

by a swinging door opening from within. A handsome brass sign bearing the words "u. s. post office," corresponding in design and finish to the letter-hole plate, is placed in the panel above the wicket.

CORNICE.—Each cabinet (unless otherwise ordered), is finished around the top with a handsome molded cornice of ash, 2½ inches high.

GENERAL.—In general, each "Standard" cabinet contains all the features above enumerated, and is better, more convenient and cheaper than anything heretofore made for the use of Postmasters.

PACKING.—Each cabinet is packed, without extra charge, in a stout, wooden packing case, so as to admit of shipment to any destination.

PROMPT DELIVERY.—It is intended to keep in stock at every office of the Company, as stated on the title page, each of the regular styles of cabinets here illustrated, so that orders can be filled on the day of their receipt.

The vertical divisions of these boxes are made of well-seasoned, selected poplar or whitewood, and the bottoms are of brass wire, which prevents an accumulation of dust. All the boxes have brass numbered plates, numbered in black shaded with red and enameled finished, which also serve as guards to prevent and breakage of the glass by mail violently thrown into the box. At the rear of each box are provided wood strips, on which are attached card-board blanks, numbered to correspond with the boxes, to receive the names of the box renters.

The brass wires and number plates present a very handsome metallic appearance, and the beauty of the boxes is augmented by the polished ash sash, glazed with double thick French glass. The sash is so attached to the boxes with screws that it may be quickly taken off for cleaning, when necessary.

The most convenient arrangement of boxes is in nests not over 10 boxes high. The size of each nest or section should not exceed 30 boxes in width, for safety of transportation.

The space occupied by any number of "Standard" Call boxes may be estimated in the following manner:

Height of Boxes. Multiply the number of boxes in height by 5 inches, and add 13/4 inches for frame at top and bottom.

Width of Boxes. Multiply the number of boxes in width by 23/4 inches, and add 11/2 inches for frame at sides.

For Example: 10 boxes high by 10 boxes wide measure (50+13/4) 513/4 inches in height and (27½+1½) 29 inches in width and 10 boxes high by 20 boxes wide measure (50+13/4) 513/4 inches in height and (55+1½) 56½ inches in width.











"COMPOSITE" POST OFFICE LOCK BOX.

The "Yale" (bronze) post office lock box is long and favorably known, but in order to meet the demand for a lock box of cheaper construction, adapted to the use of post offices of the smaller sizes, we have designed the new "Composite" shown in the full size illustration herewith.

The boxes, or pigeon holes, are of wood, 4 inches wide by 4½ inches high, inside. Attached to the front of each section is a neatly finished frame of ash, corresponding in style and finish with the Cabinets described in this catalogue. The doors closing the lock boxes consist of a metal skeleton, enclosed within a hard composition of a rich brown color and handsome finish. The door is hung, by a continuous brass hinge, to the ash frame on the front of the boxes

above described, and has a large panel of glass provided with a brass number plate, numbered in black and red and enameled finish, and secured by a Yale lock with corrugated key. The whole construction of the door is exceedingly strong, elegant, and handsome, and the material such that its appearance will not be affected by temperature or age. We have been considering for years the production of a lock box, suited not only in construction but in price to smaller offices, and confidently offer this box as being perfectly adapted for the purposes intended.

The Yale lock is now so well known as to perhaps need but little description. Its invention, by the late Linus Yale, Jr., revolutionized the art of lock making in America. Within the past few years an improvement almost as important as the original invention has been effected. This consists in corrugating the blade of the key in longitudinal lines, as shown in the engraving, and in forming the key-hole with a VALE CORRUGATED KEY.





The pigeon holes or boxes are made of well-seasoned, selected poplar or whitewood, the divisions between them being neatly faced with an ash frame finished and varnished to correspond with the wood-work of the Cabinets. Each of the composite doors is attached to this frame by a continuous brass hinge, and is secured by a Yale lock having two corru-



In ordering special Cabinets, indicate first which Center pier (that is, the portion enclosed by the paneled wood-work in front and containing the alphabetical boxes, wicket, cash drawer, etc.), as shown in the preceding illustrations, is desired, then specify the number of call boxes and their arrangement, and the number and arrangement of lock boxes, if any. Whenever possible, it is best that Cabinets be arranged on the eight-high system, as shown in the illustrations, that is, to have eight boxes in each vertical section or row, which makes the total height of the Cabinet about right when it is placed on an ordinary counter, the height of the latter being usually thirty-six inches.






