## EARLY HISTORY OF FALL RIVER.

The territory comprising the township of Fall River was a subtribal post within the limits of the Pokanoket confederacy, at the head of which, on the landing of the pilgrims at Plymouth in 1620, was *Massasoit*, father of the world-renowned *Philip*, of Mount Hope. Under colonial jurisdiction, and subsequently, till about the year 1803, it was a part of Freetown. Its first independent corporate name was Fall River, but in 1804, by an act of the Legislature, it took the name of *Troy*, which it retained till 1834, when its original and present corporate name was restored. Fall River is bounded on the north and east by Freetown; on the south by Dartmouth, Westport and Tiverton, and on the west by Mount Hope Bay, and Taunton River, the latter known in early history as the *Titiquet*. As a township much of the territory is rough and uneven, but highly productive when subjected to skilful cultivation. The place, now, however, derives its chief importance from its natural and acquired facilities as a manufacturing town, facilities which have already brought into existence a large, yet compact village, containing nearly *twelve thousand* inhabitants. This village is near the mouth of Taunton River, at the point where that magnificent stream empties into Mount Hope Bay. The shore along the eastern bank of the river and bay is bold, elevated and picturesque, the undulating surface of which is crested by the village, not more than a quarter of a mile distant from the river's margin, yet more than a hundred and fifty feet above the surface of tide water. Two miles east of the town are the *Wahtahpee* ponds, celebrated for their abundance of large pickerel and fine white



perch. The name of these ponds, as here given, is that by which they were called by the Indians. The orthography and pronunciation of the word as generally written and heard — *Watuppa* — are erroneous. *Wahtahpee* is a legitimate *Algonquin* word, and is still in daily use among many western tribes of kindred stock, with precisely the signification attached to it by the natives here. *Wahtah* means a boat, or a place to keep a boat, and the *pee* added renders it plural, meaning boats or the place of boats.

The principal and in fact only outlet of these ponds, which are united, and made one in effect by a narrow channel, forms the stream which passes through the centre of the village, giving name to the town and furnishing the entire water power of the place. From a point just east of Main street, to the mouth of this stream, being about one fourth of a mile, the fall is 130 feet; and within this space, and laterally, depending on it, with one or two exceptions, are arranged, in close proximity, all the principal manufactories of the place. This stream retains its Indian name — *Quequechan* — a word still in use among the *Delawares*, and meaning a water-fall. It is gratifying to find so many of the aboriginal names retained in connection with the manufacturing and other establishments in Fall River. *Massasoit*, in honor of the great chief of the *Wampanoags*; *Titiquet*, the name of Taunton River; *Metacomet*, the aboriginal name of Philip, of Mount Hope; *Wamsetta*, brother of Philip, and eldest son of *Massasoit*; *Wahtahpee*, the name of the ponds; *Quequechan*, the name of the river; *Pocasset*, the name of the tribe here located; *Anawan*, Philip's chief captain; and *Corbitant*, (an embryo corporation,) the name of a sub-chief of the *Pocasset* tribe. It is due to a great and brave people thus to perpetuate their names, and a cheap reward it is for the blessings they were forced to relinquish at the command of a superior race: especially is it so, since Fall River and its immediate vicinity forms the centre of a theatre upon which transpired that series of great struggles in Indian warfare which resulted in the defeat and death of Philip

and the final dispersion of the confederate tribes. Peculiarly was this the domain of aboriginal monarchs.

The village of Fall River is of recent origin, and a signal example of rapidity in growth. Her men of middle age are older than the first foundations of her sources of wealth, and the men in her streets to-day, sported in boyhood in the jungle which covered the site of the present town. Many of her public and private edifices are substantial and neat — a few magnificent and imposing. The market building, erected in 1844, just after the great fire which destroyed the heart of the town, is among the finest specimens of architecture in New England. It is of Fall River granite, in ashler, and contains a public hall, tastefully frescoed, exceeding in dimensions that of Faneuil Hall, besides rooms for the Post Office, Custom House, Athenæum, and apartments for the transaction of the town's business.

Fall River has a fine and spacious harbor, well protected against east and northeast winds and storms, and always easy of access. Its commerce is considerable and gradually increasing. The habits of the people are sober and earnest, and in all respects do credit to the Pilgrim stock from which they as a body descended. The common school system in the village, is carried out to its legitimate results, and the High School is a model of its kind. For details in business operations, the following pages, it is believed, will be found to contain all that can be desired.

Fall River is distant from Boston 52 miles; from Providence 18; from Newport 18; from New Bedford 14, and from Taunton 17; to all of which access is had either by railroads or by steamboats, or by both. Its New York line of steamboats is celebrated throughout the country.

### POPULATION

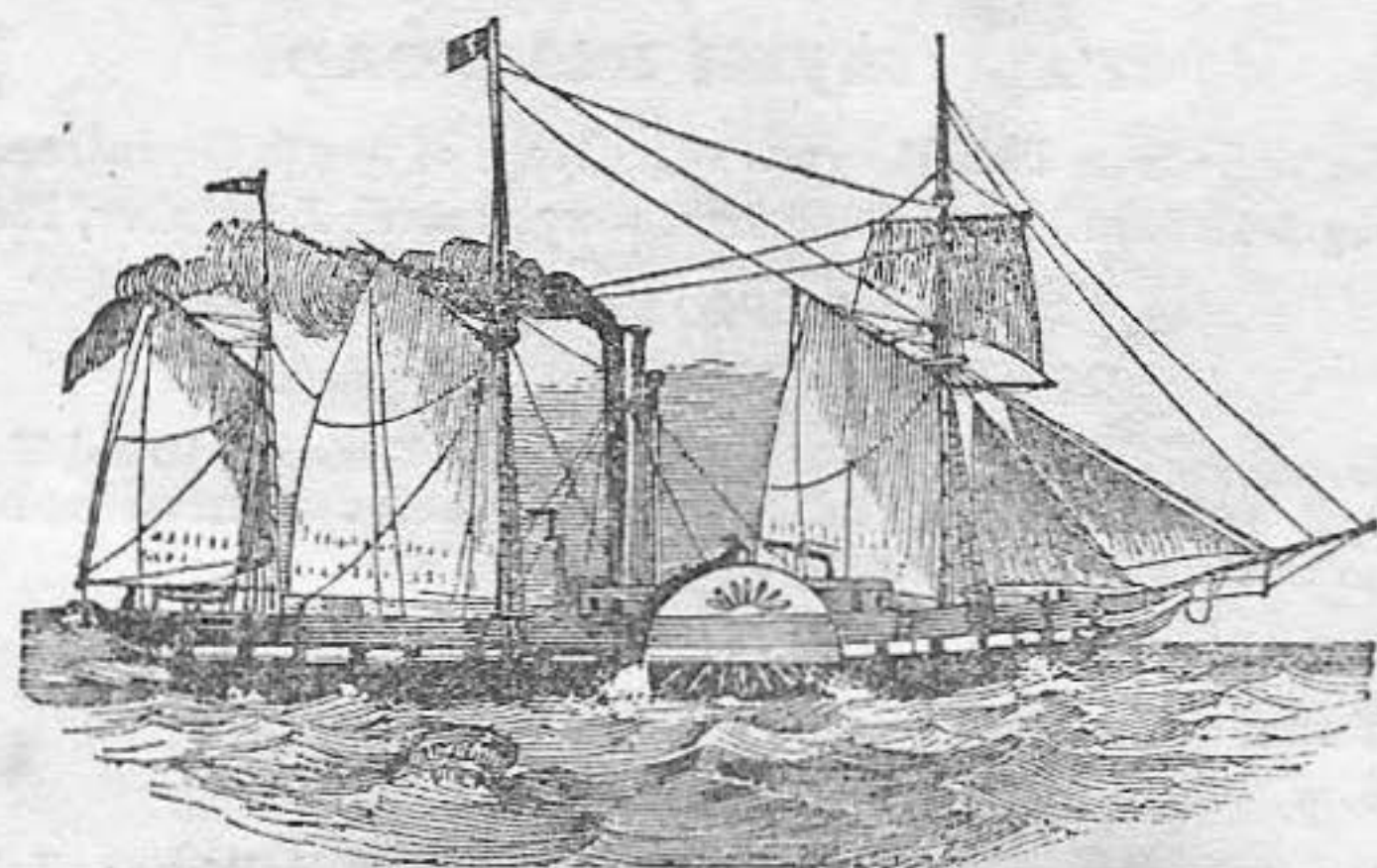
